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### RUSHING AROUND IN APRIL



Planting rushes in the "trenches"

The planting season got off to a huge start at the beginning of April. 11,000 rushes and sedges were planted in just 6 days! A heap of work was needed before the planting began: brush cutting dead Queensland Blue grass which had been killed with herbicide earlier. Contractors cut narrow trenches through the thick mat of dead grass so that the seedlings could be planted into the soil of the lake bed. The remainder of the dead grass will be left in place; it will slowly decay and should help prevent the spread of the invasive grass and other weeds.

The FOLC led a small group from the Conservation Volunteers WA (CVA) during the week. They planted a total of 7000 seedlings! Over the last few years, the FOLC have developed a strong partnership with the Conservation Volunteers. The FOLC are able to hire the CVAs for at least 2 weeks of the year. As part of the service, the CVAs provide a supervisor, all the tools and a crew of volunteers for the week. Sometimes the CVAs are able to provide us with free planting or weeding days. The FOLC have obtained federal funding from the Caring for Our Country Program to restore the wetland buffer. This grant allows a small portion for labour costs.

On Friday afternoon Scotch College boys, as part of the Year 10 Community Service Program that the FOLC run, planted 200 sedges.

Then on Saturday we welcomed back the Shah Satnum Ji Green 'S' Welfare Force Wing, an Indian group dedicated to humanitarian and environmental volunteering. They planted 3800 rushes in less than 3 hours! The CVAs introduced the FOLC to the Indian group. They will join us for a total of 5 planting sessions. We are very lucky to have their support!

Recognizing our many volunteers. In fond memory of Ted Tocock whose exceptional ethics of volunteerism and community service are an inspiration to all of us.

When we first moved to Strickland Street in 1996, I knew little about Lake Claremont but my husband, Terry, had supervised Cross Country Running while a teacher at Scotch College and had become very fond of the area.

When he saw an advertisement for a vacant block opposite the Lake Claremont Golf course in 1995, he insisted that we have a look, and the rest, as they say, is history!

Soozie Ross was the driving force behind FOLC at the time we first became involved in 2003. I remember planting sessions on the slope leading to the drive in-site, and on the island in the West side of the lake. We also planted paperbarks and other trees in the dried up lake near the gazebo one summer. I remember planting trees with Scotch College boys by the path on the West side of the lake only to find shortly afterwards that they had been vandalised and uprooted!

With the closure of the long Golf Course in 2009 and the FOLC obtaining many substantial grants, the planting has become much more extensive. I decided that my knees were no longer up to kneeling but told Heidi that I was happy to supervise groups, (as a retired teacher, I am good at giving orders!)

One of the sessions that I enjoyed most was with a group of young people from Bank West in 2012. I supervised a team called 'Super Planters' who came dressed in Superman capes and planted a mixture of seedlings in record time. I have also enjoyed working with the Shah Satnam Ji Green 'S' Welfare Force Wing, the Scotch College students and the Conservation Volunteers.

As a 'non-planter', I am happy to volunteer in other capacities and I enjoyed working with Cath McAuley and others to prepare and serve food at Tanya Young's Open Garden Day. It was a wonderful occasion and I enjoyed the company of other volunteers.

Working on the parking for the Royal Show and Caravan and Camping show with Nick Cook was also (surprisingly) a most enjoyable experience and again I loved meeting the other volunteers.

My new task is to coordinate the local primary school planting sessions in June. This is at present a work in progress but hopefully will all come together in time!

I hope that reading this will encourage others who do not feel up to planting to get involved with FOLC – there are so many different ways to volunteer!

#### APRIL BUSY BEE - REMOVING A GRASSY KNOLL

What to do with the excess Queensland Blue trenched out of the lake bed (mentioned in the previous article)? Pick it up and remove it of course. An ideal task for the FOLC at their monthly busy bee held the second Sunday of every month. A huge heap of grass was removed while volunteers enjoyed the beautiful weather. The idea is to prevent the decaying grass from blowing back into the trenches on top of the newly planted rushes and help reduce the nutrient load. Queensland Blue was probably introduced from South Africa and has a useful purpose as turf, but it is a highly invasive species for the wetland.

#### IN BLOOM THIS MONTH

The Red Flowering Paperbark (*Melaleuca viridiflora* – red form) is the Melaleuca variety that most looks like, and is confused with, Bottle Brushes. The difference is the bark of the tree which is papery and white. The tree is drought tolerant yet is suitable for all soils including wet areas and it attracts honey eaters.

#### **OUR BIRDS**

Southern Ninox Boobook (novaeseelandiae). The call of the Boobook is perhaps the best known of all Australian nocturnal birds – the soft double hoot can be heard shortly after dusk, sometimes until first light. These carnivorous birds feed only at night; they spend the day roosting in tree hollows or under dense foliage. One has been seen using a nesting box on the slope to the west of the lake, below the Lakeway development. Boobooks are widespread in all parts of Australia where there are sufficient trees for their breeding hollows.
