In Bloom this Month

We are delighted that a few orchids have been popping up around Lake Claremont this spring. It is very exciting as this indicates that natural regeneration is starting to happen. Two types of orchids that are around presently are the Common Mignonette Orchid and the Pink Fairy Orchid.

Please be careful not to disturb these plants if you see them. Note that when the Common Mignonette Orchid first appears, it looks like a single rounded blade of grass, (quite rush like in appearance).


If you find any single Pink Fairy Orchids in the bushland, please notify Friends of Lake Claremont, as we would like to know the location in order to place a protective mesh ring around them. This helps them to survive and multiply.

White-cheeked Honeyeater *Phylidonyris niger*



On 24th September I was walking along the tarmac path at the north of the lake and I heard a call, which I didn't immediately recognise. It was something like a New Holland Honeyeater, but not quite right. After a frustrating ten minutes or so, I glimpsed the bird. It was a White-cheeked Honeyeater, the first I have seen at our lake for some time. These birds are very similar to the New Holland Honeyeater, but differ in having a bold white cheek and a stronger bill; they lack the New Holland's white eye ring. In Perth they are more often seen in the bushland (Bold Park is a good place to find them) whereas the New Holland is common in suburban gardens.

Turtle Update

The turtle nesting season has started at Lake Claremont. Readers may have read the article in the Cottesloe Post describing how Claremont Councillor, Kate Main, was walking her dog round Lake Claremont when someone ahead of her saw a baby turtle in trouble. The turtle was struggling so Ms Main took it home and contacted the Friends. I tried releasing it but it was too weak so I took it home to recover. By the morning it was looking much stronger and was successfully released among the safety of fringing vegetation.

Turtles have been hatching for 6 months and females started nesting this month. Hatchlings and gravid females are at most risk of predation between the nest and the lake. People are encouraged to report sightings using a free app called Snap Send Solve or to contact the FOLC, who would also be keen to hear from anyone who sees a fox in the area. Ravens are responsible for most turtle deaths.

The FOLC are working closely with the Town of Claremont to finalise plans for a Baseline Population study of our Oblong turtles. We hope to have this organized to go ahead this summer, before the lake dries out.

FOLC plans to apply for a grant to facilitate the implementation of the study.

The study involves trapping, marking and releasing turtles, taking measurements and identifying males and females.

The study has been ranked as a high priority in the Lake Claremont Management Plan-Draft (LCMP) and will greatly add to our knowledge of our resident turtle population. It will also provide a vital baseline from which future monitoring can be measured against and help to inform management decisions.

Over the last 2 years we have been collecting dead turtle carapace at the lake and we expect that the data we have will help to inform the population study and provide some clues to turtle movements and possible nesting areas.

After recent sightings of fox activity at the Lake by FOLC members and Town of Claremont staff, contractors are now on site trapping. A female fox was caught on September 23 and trapping continues after fresh tracks were sighted over the following weekend. This will help to protect the turtle population.

The Tuesday volunteers were not so fortunate as there was a heavy downpour that afternoon!

Over the four days, we parked 670 cars and raised about \$10,000 for the FOLC, which is an excellent result.

September Night Chat – Restoring Lake Claremont

At the end of September, 29 FOLC members and other interested people braved the wet, windy and decidedly chilly weather to attend the Night Chat presented by Heidi Hardisty in the relative warmth of the clubroom at Claremont Swimming Pool.

Heidi gave us a fascinating overview of the history of Lake Claremont from the early days of European settlement to the present time.

She focused in particular on pivotal moments in the recent history of Lake Claremont, including its designation as a Bush Forever site (2000), the establishment of FOLC (2003), the narrow decision to remove the long-9-hole golf course and retain all 23 hectares for the Lake and its surrounds (2009), and the incorporation of FOLC so that funding applications could be made.

Heidi explained that a further key factor that has enabled FOLC to achieve such spectacular success over the past 7 years has been the development of a park concept plan by the Town of Claremont. This plan not only serves as a template for grant applications, but also provides a framework within which FOLC achievements can be documented. She then proceeded to outline FOLC's spectacular achievements over the past 7 years: 19 grants amounting \$512.000 and 280,000 seedlings planted by 6000 people in a range of different volunteer groups.

Looking towards the future Heidi explained that, although the first stage of the concept plan will be completed in 2 to 3 years' time, much still remains to be done: monitoring and statistical reporting, better information for and communication with the public, increased hours for a bush-care officer and so on.

Thank you, Heidi, for a highly professional and engaging talk.
