On Friday May 25 the Town of Claremont hosted their inaugural Volunteer of the Year Awards function. For the first time the Town has created 4 categories and awards to recognise outstanding achievements in volunteering in Claremont.

The Volunteer Team of the Year Award went to The Friends of Lake Claremont for working tirelessly on nature conservation at Lake Claremont. The Friends have raised over \$580,000 in grants and planted more than 350,000 seedlings to help restore the wetlands and surrounding area.

The Town of Claremont has the highest rate of volunteer participation of any local government in WA and more than half of the volunteer hours worked are from Friends of Lake Claremont.




This was a very productive session. Next month will see the start of the new planting season and there will be plenty of opportunities for the community to become involved.

OUR BIRDS

Spotted Pardalote, Pardalotus punctatus

When Pam and I were conducting the autumn survey on 18th May we were lucky enough to see a small group of Spotted Pardalotes. This is only the second time that I have seen this beautiful little bird at our lake; they are relatively common in the south west forests and some birds move to Perth area in the colder months.

Spotted Pardalotes feed on insects, usually high in eucalypts. It seems that trees in the earliest revegetated areas now have sufficient insect life to attract these birds.

Spotted Pardalotes nest in a tunnel, which they excavate in steep banks. They normally breed in the south west but there are records from the Swan Coastal Plain.

MORE TURTLE NEWS

In May we received a call from TORRN (Turtle Oblonga Rescue and Rehabilitation Network) that our hatchling (young Nick) was ready to be returned to the Lake. His mother was euthanized by vets after a raven attack before she was ready to lay her eggs.

Another hatchling raised by the same volunteer was also offered to us for release at Lake Claremont. We have named him Zac!

Nick Cook and Zac Hardisty released the 2 hatchlings at the Lake's edge amongst fringing vegetation.

Although young Zac was not originally from Lake Claremont, it is good to have the introduction of genetic diversity at the Lake.

DEVELOPMENTS TO THE EAST OF LAKE CLAREMONT



There is a lot going on at the East side of Lake Claremont!


Works on the two new nature playgrounds at Lake Claremont have now commenced. The playgrounds have been designed to fit in with the natural environment of the Lake Claremont Recreation Precinct.

The larger playground, suitable for 8-12 year olds, is the first to be installed next to the Lake at the end of Lapsley Rd. The smaller, toddler playground will be located next door to Lake Espresso. Both playgrounds are due to be finished by the end of June.









BORE DRILLING AT LAKE CLAREMONT

Members may have noticed the drilling rig to the East of the Lake. Nick Cook has received the following information from the Town of Claremont.

The bore is owned by dept of water and environment regulations and is 416m deep. It will be used solely for monitoring and inspection purposes.

It will monitor the deep Leederville aquifer as part of an environmental study on ground water and used to create more accurate water modelling for the western suburbs. It will also be used to research the longer term vision to inject waste water from the Subiaco treatment plant to recharge the deep Leederville aquifer.

The bore will be used in conjunction with the two adjacent shallow bores, which are at approximately 25m to monitor and research the relationship between the shallow and deeper aquifers.

MAY NIGHT CHAT

Our speaker in May was Ruth Clark, who is a founding member, Secretary and Wetland Trustee of the Waterbird Conservation Group. This was established in 1984 and was initially formed in response to a botulism outbreak at Thomson's Lake Nature Reserve and was the main rescue group for waterbirds for over 15 years in the Perth area. The sick birds were easy to catch and were nurtured in members' bathrooms and laundries! 1600 birds were rescued and there was an amazing success rate of 90%. Once recovered, the birds were released to unaffected wetlands.

In 1993 the Group's direction changed when it took on the vesting of Folly and Maramanup Crown Reserve in Baldivis (just before the freeway went through) and it has actively managed and restored the reserve since.

Their challenges have been very different to those at Lake Claremont and include invasion by kangaroos, sheep, motorbike riders and rubbish dumpers! There has been invasion by kikuyu and cotton bush, which grows fast and pods up twice a year with millions of seeds in each pod. Much work has been done on fencing, weed removal and reticulation and large scale planting has been carried out.

The group has purchased several remote sensor cameras. These cameras have revealed a great variety of wild life including many birds as well as a possum, bandicoots, water rats, kangaroos, Goulds Mountain Spoonbill and the Common Bronzewing. They have also shown foxes, rabbits, a cat and cattle at Folly.

There was much discussion both during and after the talk and there was comparison of the Management and financing of Friends of Lake Claremont and that of the Folly and Maranamup Reserve. It was a very interesting evening and was enjoyed by all who attended. Thank you, Ruth!

2018 WINTER PLANTING SEASON

Please join us for the massive 2018 winter planting season! The FOLC will need hundreds of volunteers to plant 30,000 native seedlings as we continue one of the largest ongoing restoration projects in Perth.

We only plant species known to be indigenous to the area. Our tube stock is purchased from 3 nurseries: Apace WA, Plantrite and Native Plants WA. The seedlings are not watered in, but rely on the winter rains to establish their roots before the hot, dry summer.

This year the FOLC will plant several areas on the east side of Lake Claremont (Areas A to D on the map shown) purchasing approx. 24,000 seedlings with a grant we won from the State NRM (Natural Resource Management) Program. Planting patches of native vegetation will increase wildlife habitat for insects, reptiles and birds, and make a more beautiful park.

The other planting area is the remnant bushland on the west side of Lake Claremont (top left corner in the map shown). It is the last 3 hectares of bushland in Claremont which has some of its original soil structure intact. Groundcover, shrubs and trees like Banksias will be planted, to increase the varieties of plants in the bushland, as well as its health which has been suffering in recent years, partly due to decreasing rainfall and the drying climate. The FOLC will purchase about 5500 native seedlings for this project with a grant they won from the Swan Alcoa Landcare Program (SALP).



The FOLC are supported and directed by the Town of Claremont (TOC) staff who chose the areas to plant according to the park plan. The Year 10 boys from Christ Church Grammar School and Scotch College who attend the FOLC Community Service Program on Friday afternoon have helped to mulch the planting areas over the past several weeks.

Our planting sessions (June to August) are attended by local residents, school students, corporate and community groups, as well as by our own members.

JUNE NIGHT CHAT AT LAKE CLAREMONT

Buzzing over Native Bees

Tuesday 26th June, Claremont Aquatic Centre, 5:30-7:00 pm

When people think bee, they usually think of the European honeybee, *Apis mellifera*. Yet Australia hosts an incredible diversity of native bees. PhD researcher and native bee scientist Kit Prendergast will showcase the amazing diversity of native bees that occur in Australia, with a focus on southwest WA, where she is conducting her research on how native bees respond to urbanisation, and the impact of honeybees on native bees.

You will come away buzzing about these charismatic critters, and armed with knowledge about how to help promote native bees in the 'burbs.

Kit Prendergast is a young native bee researcher from Western Australia. She is currently doing a PhD at Curtin University, under a Forrest Scholarship, an international scholarship of which only three entrants are awarded with per year. Her thesis is the "Determinants of native bee assemblages in urban habitat fragments in the southwest Australian biodiversity hotspot and interactions between honeybees (*Apis mellifera*) and native plant-pollinator communities."

Kit has a passion for the natural world and gets a real buzz when going out in the field to conduct native bee surveys. Her surveys have underscored the incredible diversity of Australia's native bees that occur within the urban milieu of the southwest Western Australian biodiversity hotspot. Kit aspires for her research to lead to science-based actions for conserving thriving native bee assemblages.

The event is hosted by the Friends of Lake Claremont at the Claremont Aquatic Centre, 12 Davies Road, Claremont. The talk commences at 6:00 pm. Doors open for refreshments at 5:30 pm. A gold coin donation is appreciated.
