SPRING BIRD SURVEY

Conducted on 31 October 2025

On 31st October morning my daughter Sacha and I conducted a survey of the birds at Lake Claremont. The morning was warm and mostly clear with a variable breeze.

The water level was as high as we have seen at this time of the year, above the 2m AHD mark.

We recorded 387 individuals of 37 species. This is our average number of species but fewer individuals than is normal for our spring surveys. Waterfowl numbers were mostly below average.

“Surprisingly Grey Teal, normally abundant in spring, were not seen.”

Breeding activity was noted for Pacific Black Ducks, Black Swan, Coot, Red Wattlebird, Raven and Welcome Swallow.


A highlight was the **Swamp Harrier** (*Circus approximans*, Dilyordoo). See more about these interesting birds on the next page.

OUR BIRDS

Swamp Harrier *Circus approximans* DILYORDOO

These raptors favour rushy swamps and lakes. They are resident at Herdsman Lake (Njookenbooro) and they sometimes visit us at this time of the year, searching for easy prey amongst the juvenile waterfowl.

The plumage is variable, but adults have a distinctive white band on the rump.

Swamp harriers nest low down in dense reed beds. Two to five eggs are laid but normally only one or two young survive.

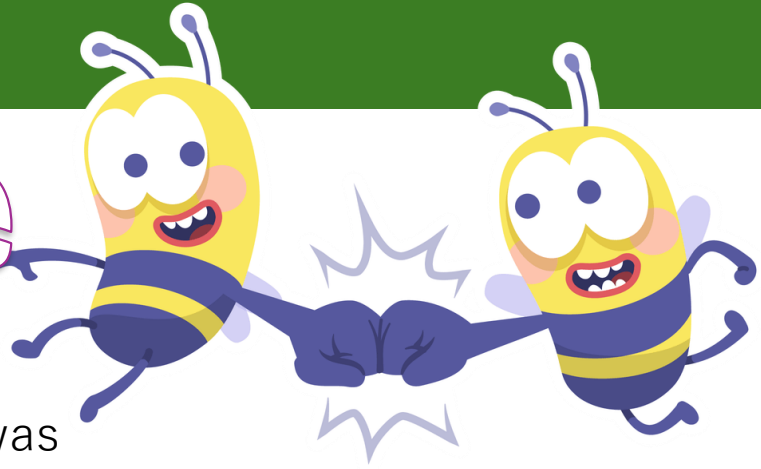
